From the Desk of Rabbi Marmon

Before reading on, take a moment to answer this question: we light Chanukah candles in our windows for פרסומי ניסא (*pirsumei nisa*), "publicizing the miracle" of Chanukah. What is the miracle of Chanukah?



Chances are, your answer had to do with a one-day supply of sanctified and sealed oil that miraculously burned for eight days until more oil could be

consecrated. If so, you are not wrong. The Talmud tells that story (at Shabbat 22b) in answer to its own version of the question, simply, "What is Chanukah?"

However, the sages also give what might be a more comprehensive, and more factual, answer in the על הניסים (*'al ha-nissim*) prayer which is added to our *Amidah* and *Birkat Ha-Mazon* (grace after meals) during the holiday. In that prayer, we say that God "delivered the mighty into the power of the weak, the many to the power of the few, the impure to the pure, the wicked to the righteous, the contemptuous to those occupied with Torah." This is a poetic and prayerful way of expressing that a small group of Jews, led by a family of priests without military training, surprisingly overcame the might and will of a branch of the post-Alexandrian Greek Empire, to reestablish a relatively tiny independent Jewish kingdom in the Land of Israel in the age of extensive empires in the Mediterranean and Middle East.

It's interesting to note that the public-facing symbol, the menorah, uses a simplistic definition of a miracle: a supernatural event defying physical laws of nature. On the other hand, the understanding of "miracle" that informs our private prayers is much more sophisticated: it sees God intervening behind the scenes to subtly defy the laws of probability, history, geopolitics, and military science; and it sees human action partnered with God's will to bring the miraculous outcome. In a simplistic worldview, the first type of miracle is highly impressive: God bends the rules at will. In a more mature outlook, the second interpretation is more uplifting: our commitment and striving, with God's subtle help, bends history towards justice. The first view leaves us only to await divine deliverance, while the latter calls us to action in troubled times.

Join us for Breakfast, Movie and a Live Discussion with Dr. Tomáš Kraus straight from Prague!



Sunday, November 6 with breakfast at 9:30am movie and presentation at 10am

During the Nazi regime in Czechoslovakia, Judaica items were confiscated. These artifacts, including Torah scrolls, were brought to Prague and given numbers. Then, during the communist regime, many were dispersed around the world. One reached Chicago where upon Marvell Ginsburg wrote what would become the beloved children's book <u>The Tattooed Torah</u>. This story, which was made into an animated film, recounts the true rescue and restoration of a small Torah from Brno, Czechoslovakia. This Torah is described as the most "precious possession" of the Jewish people—a symbol that represents memories tied to cultural heritage, family, hope and resilience. Narrated by actor Ed Asner, the film teaches historical information about the Holocaust in an elegantly simple but profoundly beautiful, charmingly innocent, poignant, powerful and deep manner.

Following the film, we will have a live presentation and discussion with Dr. Tomáš Kraus who is a graduate in law from Prague's Charles University, worked in the Czech music industry and for an agency for creative artists. Since 1991, he has been the Executive Director of the Federation of Jewish Communities in the Czech Republic, in which position he was rebuilding the whole infrastructure of Czech Jewish Communities. Dr. Kraus is one of the founding members of B'nai B'rith Renaissance Lodge, was elected Vice President of the World Jewish Congress, Vice President of the European Jewish Congress and a representative of the American Jewish Committee for the Czech Republic. Also, he has taught at New York University and in Prague.

As I write, my sukkah has just come down, and Chanukah seems a long way off. There is plenty of excitement to fill the interim, though. Next Shabbat (which will be before you read this), we begin the Torah anew. While every word of Torah is rich with meaning and interpretation, the stories we will be reading over the coming months of late fall and winter are among the most engaging and approachable, and have inspired generations of Jews and others. We'll be reading about difficult family dynamics, struggles to overcome personal weaknesses, and other themes that are easily understandable, meaningful, and relevant to our lives to this day. I encourage you to join us for the fun; we'll keep the place warm for you.

Let me also remind and encourage you to join us for weekday *minyanim*, which will be moving back to their pre-pandemic timeframe of 7:30 am Monday and Thursdays, with in-house breakfast following. I would like to ask each of you whose schedule is open at that time of the morning to set yourself a goal that is reasonable in your mind, be it once a week, once a month, or once every two months, besides your own yahrzeit days, and try to stick to it throughout the year. First of all, if you want to have a minyan when you come in to say Kaddish, it's only fair to help make the minyan when others have a yahrzeit. Second, we have years of catching up to do on the community business of sitting around a table together schmoozing. Third, you might just find that you enjoy the rhythms of regular davenning and the company of our regular crowd. There's an old line I have seen attributed to the author Harry Golden: "Cohen comes to shul to talk to God; I come to shul to talk to Cohen." There is nothing wrong with that, so long as you talk to God during the minyan and Cohen over breakfast afterward.

I will share one final programming note: this year, the 25th of December falls on Sunday and is the seventh day (eighth night) of Chanukah. It seems many of our friends and neighbors will be occupied that day, and many businesses and entertainments will be closed. Being a weekend, a school vacation day, and the last evening of the year to light Chanukah *licht* together, it seemed an ideal occasion to schedule an evening of fun, games, and movies for children and adults here at the synagogue, to make up for the lack of things to do around town. Mind you, that might be a fine date for us to have a social day together in other years, but the confluence of circumstances this year was too good to ignore. No word yet on whether the menu will be the traditional Chinese. Please RSVP to the office and come enjoy – you had other plans?

"A Moral Obligation"

Charles Berlin and 60 years of collecting for Harvard Library

"I tell people the first 60 years are the hardest," jokes Charles Berlin '58, Ph.D. '63. He would know: Berlin has headed Harvard Library's Judaica Division since September 1962, when he was a 26-yearold graduate student finishing a dissertation in Jewish studies, and the division, which documents Jewish life and culture—in every language, place, historical period, and format—was just getting started. "Oh, that sounds like a lot of fun," Berlin, the Friedman bibliographer in Judaica in the

Harvard College Library, remembers blithely thinking when he was first offered the job, which had just been created. "I had spent basically my whole student life in the library."

This September marks Berlin's 60th anniversary with the Judaica Division, which is also turning 60. The largest collection of its kind outside of the National Library of Israel, the division's holdings (which amount to 5 percent of Harvard Library's total) include books, periodicals, maps, musical scores, posters, photographs, audio and visual recordings, and all kinds of ephemera. For instance: the assemblage that decorates the metal filing cabinets in Berlin's office—dozens of refrigerator magnets, from cities around the world, listing local Shabbat candle-lighting times. "Most people will get this from their synagogue once a year," says Judaica collection specialist Vardit Samuels, "and afterward they'll throw it away." It's the kind of artifact that's rarely preserved, except in places like this.

More than 100 languages are represented in the Judaica collection, and the number of titles exceeds 900,000; on top of that, a massive digital archive includes 6.3 million images. Among the division's holdings are particularly rich collections related to Israeli politics and elections, theater, Jewish music, and the ultra-Orthodox Jewish world. "Our mission is to collect comprehensively," Berlin says. "We don't make value judgments; we collect. And we try to collect everything, because we cannot be censors of what scholars will do…..You never know what a scholar will find interest in discovering. And if it's not there, they can't iscover it."

Although the Judaica division was established formally in 1962, Harvard's collection of Judaic artifacts dates back to the Puritans. Among the books that John Harvard left to the College in 1638 were a number of Hebrew grammars, and Hebrew was a part of the curriculum from the beginning (the first president, Henry Dunster, was a Hebrew scholar). The College Library's catalog from 1723 lists Hebrew rabbinic texts printed in Italy and the Netherlands, along with Latin translations of Hebrew texts (all, however, destroyed in the fire that consumed Harvard Hall in 1764). More items arrived during the eighteenth and nineteenth centuries: 2,000 Yiddish publications donated in 1898, plus smaller and more specialized Judaica collections in the law and medicine libraries.
